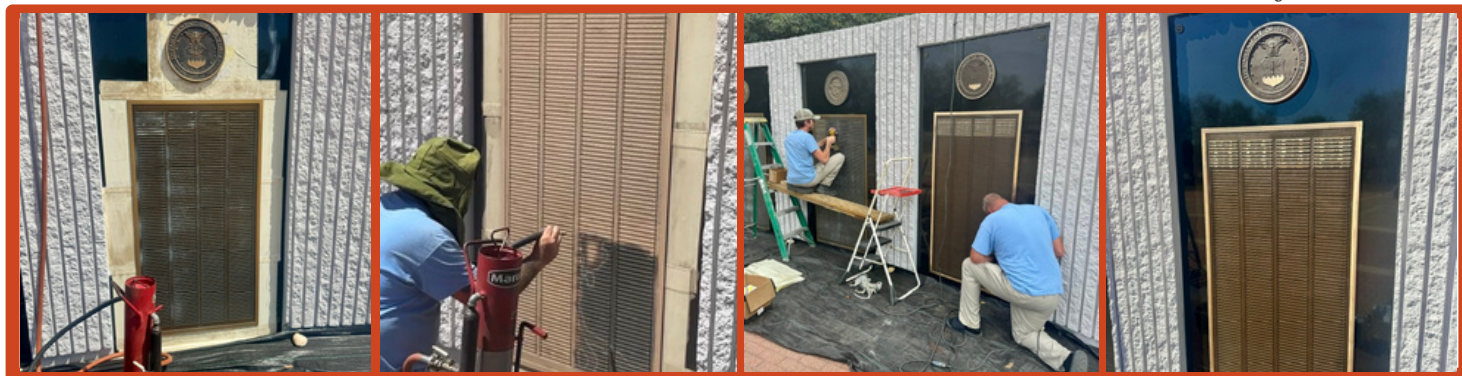

Fire in the Hole George "Ninja" Nichols Retirement Golf Tourney

"On May 2, the San Antonio Hill Country concurrently honored our EOD fallen with a day filled with fun, camaraderie and remembrance at the 2026 "Fire in the Hole" EOD Memorial Golf Tournament during EOD weekend festivities. Colonel George "Ninja" Nichols was retiring after 26 years of service as a career Air Force civil engineer and wanted to give back by hosting a golf tournament to raise funds to refurbish the EOD Memorial. The EOD Warrior Foundation went all in on the idea. The Memorial today in Niceville honors all Service fallen in EOD and back in 2001, he helped complete the project as his first as a 2Lt while stationed at Eglin AFB. Many of them he served with and knew personally.

There were 19 teams and 75 players from around the world who traveled in for his retirement and then paid tribute to the 20 Airmen lost since 9/11. They even kicked it off with a traditional 20 pushups. In the end they had more than 10 primary sponsors to include Valero Texas Open, two industry partners in ECC and Matrix Design Group, as well as several individuals that have close ties to some of those we've lost. When the fun was done, only the top two teams claimed prizes but the community was victorious as they raised almost **\$21,000** to help refurbish the memorial and ensure we all continue to honor our EOD teammates and their families."

“Crabfest is a collaborative effort between Brisant Co., Local EOD Shop, and I (High Order). The idea was to give back to all the amazing supporters that our respective companies have gained over the last couple of years, and of course, give back to the EOD Warrior Foundation. We thought the best way to do that would be to host an event that aligned with all three of our brands. So, we started Crabfest, a laid-back, grassroots-style event that gives the EOD Community a chance to win amazing prizes, see old friends, and make new ones. The way we raise money is by raffling off desirable products (we also give away many great items).

We secured a Title sponsor this year in Massif. We provided them with a design, and they provided us with 100 event t-shirts to sell. There might be two ways to get an EOD shirt, but there's only one way to get a Crabfest shirt. You gotta be there!

After the raffle ticket line settled down, we started the festivities. This year, we started by raffling off a Pistol from Sig Sauer. Then we sprinkled in a few giveaways. Next, we had a race to see who could whip a block of C-4 the fastest (They were training aids, put down the 15-6 paperwork). The winner walked away with a handful of prizes for his effort, then it was back to the raffle, as we still had a table full of items. We interrupted the raffle draws for a brief push-up contest. The first and second place contestants both graduated from NAVSCOLEOD the week prior and the day prior, respectively. The Crabfest attendees are what really make this thing special. The crowd was high energy, and there was no shortage of EOD humor.

We finished raffling off the remaining prizes out of roughly 50 total and closed out Crabfest 2026 by placing the remaining giveaway prizes and hundreds of stickers on the table and letting the attendees come up and grab whatever their hearts desired.

In total, we sold over 1500 raffle tickets, 100 shirts, and gave away countless free prizes. The most important stat, however, was the roughly **\$13,000** that we raised for the EOD Warrior Foundation.

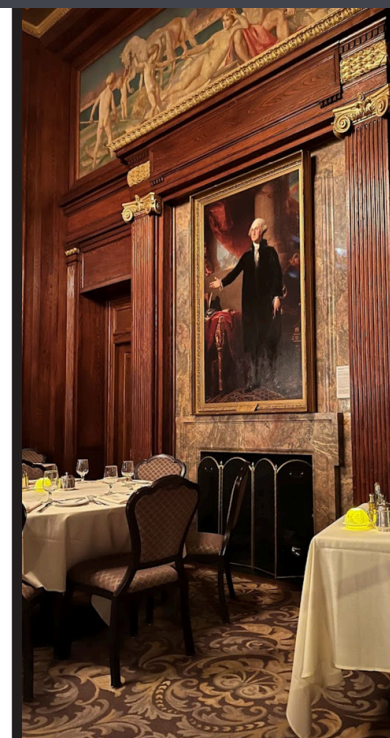

EOD Warrior Foundation Announces Board Leadership Transition

The EOD Warrior Foundation has announced an important leadership transition as longtime Board Chairman Greg K. Mittelman concludes his tenure and Leon Tackitt officially assumes the role of Chairman of the Board effective June 1, 2026.

After 15 years of dedicated service on the Board of Directors, including six years as Chairman, Mittelman leaves behind a lasting impact on the Foundation and the EOD community. Supporting EOD Families When It Matters Most

Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technicians are trained to face danger head-on. Whether supporting combat operations, protecting communities, or responding to life-threatening situations, EOD Technicians carry a unique burden that few truly understand. But even the strongest warriors and families can face unexpected hardships and when they do, the EOD Community stands together.

The EOD Warrior Foundation Financial Grant Program

The EOD Warrior Foundation Financial Grant Program exists to support EOD Technicians and their immediate family members during times of financial difficulty. From sudden emergencies and medical hardships to unforeseen life challenges, the Foundation provides assistance designed to help EOD Families regain stability when they need it most.

Eligible applicants include active-duty, retired, veteran, or fallen EOD Technicians, as well as their immediate family members. Every application is treated with care, compassion, and confidentiality throughout the process.

Applying for assistance is straightforward. Applicants can complete the grant application online through the Foundation's website. All applicants are subject to proof of EOD certification to ensure funds directly support the EOD Community and their families.

Once submitted, the application enters a thorough review process. The EOD Financial Assistance Coordinator vets all grant applications in a timely manner. Working directly with applicants to assess needs and gather any necessary supporting documentation, then submits everything to the Grant Committee. They conduct a review, and a majority vote results in the release of funds directly to the vendor or recipient.

This process ensures accountability, fairness, and responsible stewardship of donor contributions while still responding quickly to urgent needs within the EOD Family.

The reality is simple: behind every EOD badge is a family that sacrifices alongside the technician. The Foundation exists because no member of the EOD Community should have to face hardship alone.

Stronger Together: Why Belonging Matters for EOD Veterans and Techs

Many of us know what it feels like to be surrounded by people yet still feel alone. In suicide prevention research, this feeling is referred to as thwarted belongingness, a psychological state where a person feels disconnected, isolated, or like they no longer truly belong.

Thwarted belongingness is more than simply being alone. It is the painful belief that meaningful connection, support, and understanding are missing. It often includes:

- Feelings of loneliness or isolation
- Believing others do not understand what you are going through
- Feeling disconnected from friends, family, or community
- Struggling to find meaningful reciprocal relationships

Researcher Thomas Joiner identified thwarted belongingness as one of the major contributors to suicidal thoughts within the Interpersonal Theory of Suicide. When combined with perceived burdensomeness, the belief that one is a burden to others, these feelings can become especially dangerous.

Last quarter, we discussed perceived burdensomeness and how individuals may begin to believe others would be “better off without them.” Thwarted belongingness often reinforces those thoughts. When someone feels disconnected from others, it becomes easier to believe they are alone in their struggles or that no one truly cares. Over time, loneliness and hopelessness can feed each other.

Within the EOD community, connection matters! The nature of the work and experiences can sometimes make it difficult to relate to others outside the community, especially after transition, injury, loss, or significant life changes. Rebuilding connection is not always easy, but it is an important protective factor for mental health.

Some ways to combat loneliness and strengthen belonging include:

- Reaching out to another EOD Tech, even for a simple conversation
- Attending local EOD community events or gatherings
- Participating in peer support opportunities
- Volunteering and staying engaged with purpose-driven activities
- Applying for retreats or programs that encourage reconnection and healing
- Allowing trusted people to support you, even when it feels uncomfortable

At the EOD Warrior Foundation, we are committed to creating opportunities for connection across the EOD community. We currently host monthly gatherings in 20 locations, provide retreats and wellness opportunities, and offer volunteer opportunities through our Flag Program. Fundraising events, memorial events, and peer gatherings are all intended to help strengthen the bonds that make this community unique.

Connection does not have to begin with a big step. Sometimes it starts with showing up, answering a text, attending an event, or simply allowing yourself to be around people who understand.

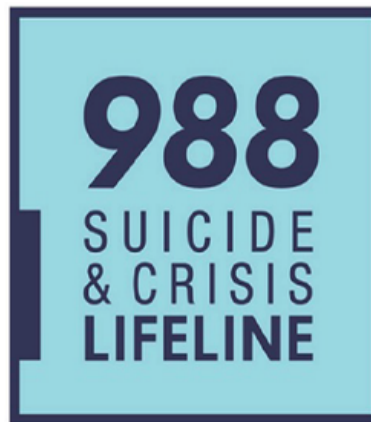

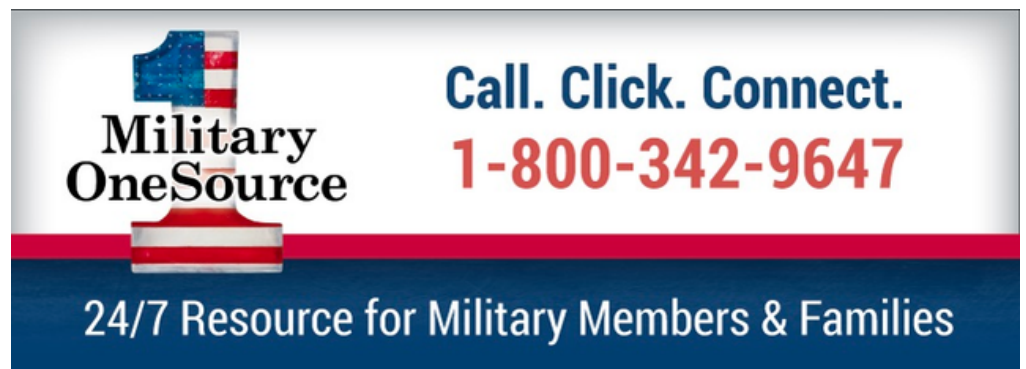

Never Alone: Supporting Children's Wellbeing in the EOD Community

In recognition of Children's Mental Health Awareness Day on May 7th, it is important to recognize the unique experiences of children growing up in the EOD community. Behind every deployment, training exercise, transition, and mission is a family adapting alongside their service member. While military children are often incredibly resilient, they can still experience stress, anxiety, loneliness, and uncertainty related to military life.

For children of both active-duty EOD Techs and veterans, frequent moves, separations, concerns about a parent's safety, and changes within the family can impact emotional wellbeing. Within the EOD community, many Techs also live with the effects of TBI, whether diagnosed or undiagnosed. TBI can affect memory, mood, emotional regulation, sleep, patience, and stress tolerance, all of which can impact the family system. Children may not fully understand why a parent seems more withdrawn, irritable, forgetful, or emotionally overwhelmed, but they often recognize that something feels different.

Children do not always express emotional struggles directly. Behavioral changes, withdrawal, anxiety, sleep issues, or declining school performance can sometimes be signs that a child is overwhelmed. Creating safe opportunities for communication, maintaining connection, and seeking support early can make a meaningful difference for military families.

One of the most important protective factors for children is connection. Spending time together, maintaining routines, and building supportive relationships within the military community can help children feel understood and less alone. At the EOD Warrior Foundation, we recognize that supporting the EOD community also means supporting spouses, caregivers, and children. This Children's Mental Health Awareness Month, we encourage families to continue checking in with one another and reminding our children that they are never alone.



Resources:

Sesame Street for Military Families — Free videos, activities, and tools that help children navigate deployments, injuries, grief, transitions, and military life challenges. Designed specifically for military-connected children ages 2–8.

Military OneSource — Offers confidential counseling, parenting support, educational resources, and family wellness tools for active duty, Guard, Reserve, and veteran families.

United Through Reading — Allows deployed or geographically separated service members to record themselves reading books to their children. Many military families say this helps children stay emotionally connected during deployments and TDYs.

Zero to Three Military Families Program — Focuses on early childhood mental health, parenting support, and helping young military children cope with stress and transitions.

Blue Star Families — Provides programs, community support, youth initiatives, and resources focused on military family wellbeing and connection.

National Child Traumatic Stress Network – Military & Veteran Families — Educational resources about childhood stress, trauma, grief, and supporting children through military and veteran family challenges.
